## **Recommended Links & Materials for New Ukulele Players**

Equipment I Use:

- Clip-on electronic tuner: A good tuner is a necessity. The <u>Fishman</u> <u>FT2</u> is hyper-accurate to within one cent and does not have any confusing 'extras' like violin or bass mode, etc..
- <u>String Swing</u> ukulele hanger. I have about 20 of these all around our house. A ukulele that is easily within reach is more likely to be played and a hanger keeps them from accidentally getting sat or stepped on. An alternative is an <u>ukulele stand</u> (though these require shelf or floor space).
- Travel Ukulele: If you need a ukulele you can keep in the car (not recommended for wood ukuleles), I suggest the Enya Carbon Fiber Travel Ukulele. It has a great 'set up' with an 'easy action' that makes it very comfortable for beginners to play. The carbon fiber composite is also very forgiving, long-lasting, and immune to the arid climate of Utah. It comes in <u>soprano</u> and <u>concert</u> sizes. I have 4 of these. They also are great to personalize with stickers and come with strap buttons already installed.
